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Publishers' data sharing policies

- Becoming more prevalent since the 2010s
- Standard requirements include sharing datasets, using data repositories, citing data, adding data availability statements to manuscripts
- Driven by community expectations; stakeholder policy; reproducibility and transparency of research

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Humanities and social sciences journals tend to have weaker data policies without data sharing mandates; few are written specifically to address the research practices of scholars in humanities and social sciences



Why is data sharing challenging for HSS scholars?



Humanities Research

- May not recognise the term "data" in relation to their work.
- Often involves copyrighted sources.
- Fewer dedicated humanities data repositories.



Social Sciences Research

- Concerns about data sensitivity and data misuse are common.¹
- Researching sensitive topics.
- Participant consent is required for data sharing.

How can HSS authors share data?



Survey of humanities authors on data sharing

89% of respondents believed that data sharing is important or very important in the humanities

81% recognise the term 'research data' as a supporting output of their research process (sometimes or all of the time)

Commonly reported data sharing methods include peer-to-peer transfer (e.g. email), data repositories, and websites

Supporting HSS data sharing in practice






Developing new HSS Open Data journal guidelines

- ✓ Better support HSS scholars to share data
- ✓ Ensure a clear understanding of what constitutes "data" in HSS
- ✓ Remove of life sciences focus and policy wording
- ✓ Build on existing work in the humanities stakeholder community
- ✓ Ensure alignment with emerging stakeholder policy e.g. US federal agencies (Nelson memo), Horizon Europe, UK's AHRC
